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What Do School Psychologists Do?

School Psychologists help children succeed in all aspects of life (academically, socially, emotionally, & behaviorally) and assist in creating supportive learning environments.

Children face everyday problems as well as serious societal issues. School Psychologists work with students, teachers, parents, and the community to address concerns, provide resources, and support to ensure all students thrive.

Job Responsibilities

Consultation

Collaborate with teachers, parents, and administrators to find effective solutions to learning and behavior problems

Intervention

Provide psychological counseling and help manage crises

Research and Planning

Use evidence-based research to develop effective interventions

Evaluate the effectiveness of academic and behavior management programs

Evaluation

Evaluate learning environments, academic skills, learning aptitude, and eligibility for special education services

Prevention

Design programs to promote student success

School Counselor:

2 years of grad school

Clinical-Child Psychologists:

Not trained in education, classroom management, or instruction

Work in hospitals, private clinic, mental health centers, or university setting

School Social Workers:

Bridging the gap between home and school Address social-emotional concerns Collaboration is key in educating the child

School Psychologists:

3 years of grad school

Trained in education and psychology

Focus on **impact** of social emotional issues, family problems, mental illness and neurological factors on learning

September 28th, 2019


Some of our first- and second-year students participated in the Sexual Assault Counseling & Information Services (SACIS) Take Back the Day 5K Run/Walk!
