C. Purchase Approval

Purchase Item: Simulation Lab Equipment

Description / Explanation: Approval is requested for the purchase of interactive manikins and a

simulation system to provide a high quality experience for the

development of the students' clinical skills in the School of Nursing. This agreement will have a contract term of ten years to allow the purchase of

the same brand of manikins for compatibility and ease of training.

Contract prices may increase annually by the Consumer Price Index (CPI).

Cost: The initial purchase is estimated to be approximately \$200,000.00,

including a five-year maintenance agreement and related CPI increases.

For the term of the contract, the total estimated price will not exceed

\$1,400,000.00, including increases due to CPI.

Rationale / Justification: The purchase of manikins and simulation system is necessary to meet the

requirements of providing a quality nursing program in today's

competitive marketplace.

An initial purchase is required in order to have an operational lab in place

for the Board of Nursing's campus accreditation visit.

It is recommended that the Board of Trustees approve this purchase item.

D. T-Mobile Lease

Radio Tower Lease Agreement

This is an amendment of an income-producing lease for space on WEIU's radio tower with T-Mobile Central LLC (T-Mobile).

Since October 27, 2005, the University has been leasing space on one of WEIU's radio towers to T-Mobile. The lease was first amended on January 14, 2016 and is now being amended again. T-Mobile is requesting that the monthly rent payment be reduced from \$2,382.83 to \$1,950.00 to bring the rent into conformity with current market conditions. T-Mobile's obligation to pay is guaranteed for the first two years of the agreement. The lease may be terminated with sixty day notice, the payment of a termination fee equal to two months of rent and the removal of T-Mobile's equipment.

In exchange for the reduction in rent, as of February 1, 2020, T-Mobile is willing to enter into a new five year agreement with five successive renewal terms of five years each. Previously, the agreement called for rate increases of 3% every year, this agreement provides a 10% increase at the beginning of each term.

WEIU uses the income from this lease to fund its regular operations.

E. Renewal of President's Contract

The Board is considering a two-year renewal of the President's contract (June 1, 2020 through May 31, 2022) with an annual salary market-based adjustment of ten percent and an additional benefit of an annual executive physical. All other terms will remain the same.

F. Honorary Degree

The Honorary Degree Committee unanimously recommended to President Glassman that the University bestow an Honorary Degree on Mr. Timothy Burke (EIU '71 and '72).

This recommendation has the full and unanimous support of President Glassman and the President's Council. We ask consideration of Mr. Timothy Burke for the Honorary Degree of **Doctor of Humane Letters.**

BRIEF BIOGRAPHY OF TIMOTHY BURKE

Tim Burke earned his bachelor's and master's degrees from EIU in 1971 and 1972. As a student, Tim was a valued member of the residence life leadership program, serving as a residence hall counselor for three years. After leaving EIU, Tim joined Arthur Andersen where he spent 22 years in the Chicago office's Financial Services practice. He led the firm's Financial Markets practice in the Central Region. Tim also led several regulatory consulting projects including a World Bank project in Indonesia to reform the nation's securities markets. In 1997, Tim joined William Blair & Company, a Chicago-based international investment bank. He was the firm's CFO and managed its administrative, finance and operations activities. He retired from Blair in 2017. Tim was appointed to the EIU Board of Trustees in 2015 and served until 2019, including a term as Chair. Tim other service to EIU includes service on the Board for the EIU-Foundation from 2008 to 2014, serving as Board President in 2012 and 2013. In 2011, Tim Burke was honored by the EIU Alumni Association with the Louis V. Hencken Alumni Services Award for his incredible service to the University and to his community. In addition, Tim Burke presented the "charge to the class" at the 2013 Fall Commencement.

EXCERPTS FROM THE NOMINATIONS RECOMMENDING TIM BURKE

"Tim is an exceptional alumnus who has served Eastern Illinois University in many capacities, with distinction in all cases."

"Tim's commitment to Eastern Illinois University exceeds any expectation for our loyal and dedicated alumni."

"Tim and his wife had been generous contributors to the University, providing more than \$400,000 in gifts to EIU over the last three decades. Tim and his wife have personally established two endowments at EIU; the *Louis V. Hencken Housing Services Scholarship* and the *Tim and Vickie Burke Evanston Scholars EIU Scholarship*. They have also routinely contributed to annual fund initiatives supporting academic departments and athletics."

"I cannot overstate my esteem for Timothy Burke as a nominee for an Honorary degree. Tim Burke epitomizes the description of an alumnus who gives 'time, talent, and treasure' to sustain EIU."

Both Tim and Vickie continue to promote EIU through their connections at Evanston High School and the Evanston Scholars program. They have even sponsored a visit to EIU for Evanston Scholars participants."

"Tim is never one to place the spotlight on himself, rather, his every effort is to promote EIU and to support our students. Consequently, many other instances of his generosity are not publicly acknowledged, at his request. However, I can assure the members of the committee that Tim's support for EIU has been substantial and has made a positive impact on our students."

"As a member of the EIU Foundation Board of Directors, Tim was a leader in every aspect of governance, serving as chairperson of various board committees, and as Treasurer, Vice-President, and ultimately President of the board."

"Tim is the very embodiment of EIU and our campus community has benefited immeasurably from his service."

First reading of proposed revisions to Board of Trustee Regulations, Board of Trustee Regulations SECTION V. Administrative Affairs, ¶J.3 and 4(a) & (f) and ¶J.1 and 3.

J. Tuition and Mandatory Fees

1. Definition

Mandatory fees are defined as tuition and other fees established by the Board which all students are assessed as a prerequisite for registration unless a waiver or other exemption has been authorized by the Board or by statute.

2. Tuition

The Board shall annually review and establish tuition rates.

3. Other Mandatory Fees

Board approval shall be required to establish or change the amount of any mandatory fee. In addition to tuition, mandatory fees which may be established at the University include the following:

- a. Activity fee
- b. Union/Bond Revenue Bond-fee
- c. Health & Counseling Service fee
- e.d. Student Legal Service fee
- d. Health and Accident Insurance fee
- e. Athletic fee
- f. University Union fee
- g. Computer Technology fee
- h. Pharmacy fee
- Textbook Rental fee
- i. Grant in Aid fee
- k. Recreation Center fee
- Campus Improvement fee

k.m. Any other fee which is a prerequisite for registration.

4. Refunds

Board approval shall be required for any refund of tuition and mandatory fees other than in accordance with the following provisions. The term "refund" is defined as the

cancellation of an unpaid obligation as well as an actual refund of an amount previously paid.

- a. (1) Any student canceling registration prior to the beginning of late registration, in accordance with established University procedures, shall be eligible for a 100% refund of any funds advanced to that date. Cancellation of registration must occur by 4:30 p.m. the last working day prior to the beginning date of late registration.
 - (2) Any student who has registered and officially withdraws from the University in accordance with established University procedures on or before the tenth day of regularly scheduled classes shall receive a refund of all tuition and mandatory fees. The insurance fee will not be refunded if institutional policy is to maintain coverage for students who withdraw, or if a claim has been submitted.
 - (3) After the first ten regularly scheduled class days, but before or on the twenty-first regularly scheduled class day, any student who completely withdraws from the University shall be eligible for a refund equal to one half of all tuition and mandatory fees.
 - (4) The University designates pro rata refund periods for summer and other sessions that are scheduled in formats that differ from the established fall and spring semesters.
- b. All refunds for students receiving Title IV Financial Aid Programs are subject to applicable rules and regulations governing those programs.
- c. Any student withdrawing from the University in accordance with established rules and whose tuition and/or mandatory fees were paid by a scholarship shall have the eligible refund paid back to said scholarship.
- d. A student may receive a refund of mandatory tuition and fees, if declared ineligible by the University for enrolled status.
- e. A student who changes from full-time to part-time status on or before the tenth day of regularly scheduled classes shall receive a refund of all mandatory tuition and fees not applicable to part-time status. A student receiving a refund of mandatory fees may not be eligible for activities and benefits covered by such fees.
- <u>f.</u> A student may receive a refund of the insurance fee, if within the first ten days of the Fall or Spring terms (first 5 days of Summer term), the student applies for said refund and demonstrates equal or better insurance coverage. A student may also receive a refund in accordance with established university policy.

K. Special Fees and Charges

1. Special Fees

Special fees are defined as all fees other than mandatory fees and shall include the following:

- a. Room and board fee
- b. Graduation fee
- c. Late registration and/or late payment fee
- d. Finance fee for installment payments
- e. Transcript fee
- f. Health & Accident Insurance fee

f.g. Any other fee which is required for graduation.

Board approval shall be required to establish or change the amount of any special fee.

3. Waivers and Refunds

Special fees may be waived or refunded in accordance with Board Regulations or by specific approval of the Board. Charges may be waived or refunded in accordance with university policy or by specific approval of the President.

A student may receive a refund of the Health & Accident insurance fee, if within the first ten days of the Fall or Spring terms (first 5 days of Summer term) the student applies for said refund and has not submitted a claim. The Health & Accident insurance fee will not be refunded if institutional policy is to maintain coverage for students who withdraw.

Financial aid in FY 2019 totaled \$81,306,261 at Eastern, a decrease of (\$2,553,904) or (-3.05%) over FY 2018. The percentage breakdown of financial aid sources is as follows: 52% federal, 11% state, 30% institutional, and 8% other.
