B. Executive Session Minutes

Section 2.06(c) of the Open Meetings Act requires that the Board of Trustees review the minutes of all executive sessions at least semi-annually to determine whether the need for confidentiality still exists as to all or part of those minutes. Minutes of executive sessions, or portions thereof, which no longer require confidential treatment must be made available for public inspection.

In order to comply with this provision, Board Counsel is reviewing executive session minutes and will provide the Board recommendations as to whether or not all or part of those minutes should remain confidential.

C. Naming Recommendation

Proposed Naming: The Glenn Hild Student Art Gallery

Glenn Hild served as a faculty member and an administrator at Eastern Illinois University from 1980-2016. He was a professor of art, Chair of the Art Department, Associate Dean and then Dean of the College of Arts and Humanities. His impact on the University and his commitment to the success of the students and the Art Department is legendary.

After Glenn Hild's retirement in 2016, Glenn's colleagues from the College of Liberal Arts & Sciences and the Department of Art & Design worked together to identify and eventually actualize a space for the professional presentation of student art for display and recognition. Glenn Hild and his wife Susan participated in early talks about the project, and Glenn, who was passionate in his support of Art students, expressed how honored he felt that his legacy in the Art Department would be carried on in this way. Glenn passed away in April of 2018 and Glenn's friends, family, and colleagues have raised \$100,000 for an endowment to provide long-term operating support for a student art gallery in the Doudna Center to honor Glenn's memory.

Glenn Hild first joined the Art Department as faculty in 1980, then served as the chair of the Art Department from 1993-2014, after which, delaying his retirement, served as Dean of the College of Arts and Humanities for two years. Glenn Hild had a significant impact on EIU through his commitment to the success of students, the EIU Art Department, the Doudna Fine Arts Center, and the larger arts community. It has often been noted that Glenn's office light was burning many an evening and far too many weekends, such was his dedication. Glenn's contributions during the extensive remodeling of the Doudna Fine Arts Center, and his sustaining the body and soul of the Art Department during the six years (2002-2008) when the department was "in the wilderness" at its location in an old grocery store, are impossible to overstate.

The Glenn Hild Student Art Gallery will memorialize the life and work of Glenn Hild. Glenn saw the gallery as an important way for EIU to enhance the professional experience for art students. The Glenn Hild Student Art Gallery Endowment sustains the ongoing operating needs of an undergraduate student gallery in the Doudna Center's Art wing. This professional gallery space introduces students to the arts professions, provides an opportunity for students to showcase their work and curate exhibitions, and acts as a dynamic core for the Department of Art and Design.

Glenn Hild's impact on EIU and commitment to the success of our students is legendary in the Art Department, the Doudna Fine Arts Center, and beyond. The naming of the Glenn Hild Student Art Gallery not only serves as an appropriate legacy, but honors the dedication and commitment Glenn had for the University and its students.

It is recommended that the Board of Trustees approve this proposal to rename the undergraduate student art gallery in the Doudna Center as the <u>Glenn Hild Student Art Gallery</u>.

COVID-19 virus. This service is less expensive than other

alternatives that have been identified.

Recommended revision to Board Regulation IV.J.2.b to read:

J. Intercollegiate Athletics Policy

- 1. An intercollegiate athletics program is an important and worthwhile activity. A properly administered program can make a significant contribution to the quality of campus and student life.
- 2. The primary responsibility for management of an intercollegiate athletics program rests with the University President. The President's exercise of that responsibility is subject to applicable law and Board policies, including the following:
 - a. The President shall inform the Board in advance of any action or proposal significantly affecting the intercollegiate athletics program, including: (1) proposals to change conferences; (2) athletic associations or divisions; or (3) to add or drop sports.
 - b. State appropriations may be used to support the intercollegiate athletics program. but no more than one and a half percent (1.5%) of the University's annual state appropriation may be expended for intercollegiate athletics unless approved by the Board.
 - c. Student athletic fees may be used to support the intercollegiate athletics program, but increases in such fees should normally not exceed the projected rate of inflation for the year in which the increase is to take effect. Proposals to increase student athletic fees should not be presented for Board approval without prior consultation with appropriate student advisory bodies.
 - d. Every effort should be made to minimize reliance on state appropriations and student fees as revenue sources for intercollegiate athletics.
 - e. The President shall prepare an annual report for the Board on intercollegiate athletics that shall include appropriate financial and program information.

In FY 2020, Eastern awarded a total of 1,893 degrees:

This compares to FY 2019 totals of 1,863 degrees overall and 1,227 bachelor's degrees, and with a five-year average of 2,190 degrees overall and 1,475 bachelor's degrees.
